Episcopal priest, poet receives award for 'demonstrated consistent excellence' in writing

Episcopal priest and poet the Rev. <u>Spencer</u> <u>Reece</u> last week was awarded the John Updike Award from the <u>American Academy of Arts and</u> <u>Letters</u>. The award, which comes with a prize of \$20,000, is given every two years to recognize a midcareer writer whose contributions to American literature have demonstrated consistent excellence.

It was established by Updike's widow, Martha. Reece is the vicar of <u>St. Paul's</u> in Wickford, Rhode Island, where he has served since late 2022.

The American Academy of Arts and Letters is a 300member honor society whose goal is to "foster, assist and sustain excellence" in American literature, music and art. It is <u>congressionally chartered</u>, and is headquartered in New York.

Reece told Episcopal News Service that when he got the email on March 6 telling him of the award, it came as a shock. "I kind of couldn't believe it for a day or two," he said. But, he added, "Being involved in a community of writers means a lot to me."

This isn't the only award Reece has received for his work. His first book of poems, "<u>The Clerk's Tal</u>e," written in 2004 when he was 41, received the Bread Loaf Writers Conference <u>Bakeless Poetry Prize</u>. Many of the poems draw on his previous career as an assistant manager for Brooks Brothers.

After the book was published, <u>The New</u> <u>Yorker</u> devoted an entire page to its opening poem, which later served as the basis for a 2010 film by actor and director James Franco that debuted at a section of the Cannes Film Festival.

He has written two other books of poetry – "<u>The</u> <u>Road to Emmaus</u>" in 2013, which was a longlist nominee for the National Book Award, and "<u>Acts</u>" in 2024. In addition to writing his own poetry, in 2017 he edited an anthology of poems, "<u>Counting Time Like</u> <u>People Count Stars</u>," written by girls at <u>Our Little</u> <u>Roses</u>, an Episcopal-affiliated orphanage in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, where Reece taught poetry for two years. It was the basis for the <u>documentary</u> "Voices Beyond the Wall: 12 Love Poems from the Murder Capital of the World."

In 2021 he published two works – a book of watercolors, "<u>All the Beauty Still Left: A Poet's Painted Book of Hours</u>," and a memoir, "<u>The Secret Gospel of Mark</u>."

He has received a <u>variety of other honors</u>, including fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts, grants from the Fulbright Foundation and the Minnesota State Arts Council, a Witter Bynner fellowship from the Library of Congress, the Amy Lowell Poetry Traveling Scholarship, and a Whiting Writers' Award.

Reece was ordained a priest in 2011 and has served in Spain and New York City in addition to his work in Honduras and Rhode Island.

When asked about overlap in his roles as priest and poet, he said that while poetry and sermon preparation are done mostly in isolation, sermons are different in that they appear in the public setting of worship. But in both instances, they are about how those words interact with their audience.

He also said that in recent years he has found his sermons and the research he does in writing them spilling over more into his poems.

Calling poetry his "great passion and great love," Reece said that after the initial recognition that came his way two decades ago, he had begun to feel that the doors to the literary world had mostly closed to him. Getting word of the John Updike award left him not only surprised but "encouraged about my writing life."

As if to validate that encouragement, he learned on March 10 that The New Yorker had picked up one of his poems – 21 years after his first appearance in the magazine and 10 years after it printed "My Great Grandmother's Bible," which also was included in the newly released "<u>A Century of Poetry in The New</u> <u>Yorker</u>."

Approval of Minutes: A motion was made by Jenn Wilkins, seconded by Jake Wilkins to approve the January 23, 2025 meeting minutes. Motion carried.

<u>Committee Reports: Finance / Building and</u> <u>Grounds</u>:

Finance: Report presented by Ginny Becker, Treasurer. Sally Ludlum made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report, which was seconded by Ann Sullivan. Motion carried.

- <u>General Fund</u>: Along with regular monthly expenses, the following invoices were paid to: Doyle Security Systems, Heritage Pipe Organ, The Observer, Axiom Office Imaging, Bahgat & Laurito-Bahgat, and the Workers' Compensation Board.
- <u>Building Fund</u>: The balance at the end of January was \$5,611.93.
- <u>Memorial Fund</u>: The balance remains \$3,072.28.
- <u>Music Fund</u>: The balance at the end of January was \$239.36.
- <u>DFT Agreement</u>: A new 3-year agreement was signed, which resulted in a savings of approximately \$17 per month.

Buildings & Ground: reported by Fr. Clement.

• The downspout near the kitchen window will need to be replaced when the snow thaws. It detached from the down spout due to ice build-up and was apparently run over by a vehicle in the driveway.

Congregational Ministries:

<u>TECW</u>: The Epiphany Tea scheduled for February has been postponed until Sunday, March 16, due to weather conditions. The event will begin at 2:00 p.m. with presenters Jake Wilkins and Professor Ted Lee who will discuss their recent trip to Honduras.

- The parish Bylaw committee recently met on February 2. The committee is currently reviewing bylaws from other congregations as a first step to compiling a draft to present to vestry.
- Lenten Program and Supper will be scheduled for four Wednesdays during Lent. Information will be provided soon, including in the upcoming newsletter.

The decorating of the church for the Easter season will be on **Friday**, **April 18**, after the Good Friday service. All are invited to join together for this special event!




Chancel Choir
